Meet our Command Staff

Tamarac Fire Rescue protects the life, health, property and natural resources of the community by providing emergency medical, fire suppression and inspection services. These services, along with proactive educational and outreach efforts, disaster preparedness and recovery help contribute to Tamarac's high level of public safety.

With a full-time equivalent (FTE) staff of 123 personnel, the department maintains daily staffing for four suppression units, five advanced life support transport units, one stand alone captain and one battalion chief.



The fire administration is responsible for and coordinates budgeting, strategic planning, performance measurement, operational policy development, EMS protocol development, human resources, training, disaster preparedness, employee health, safety, and wellness.

Tamarac Fire Rescue Accomplishments

- Two new suppression units were acquired: a Quint and an Engine.
- TFR ALS Team Wins 1st Place at the Florida Fire Conference ALS Competition, Connie Rhea St. Augustine and brought home the Florida Cup after competing at the Miami-Dade EMS Competition.
- ALS Team secures 2nd Place at the First There First Care Conference.
- ALS Team achieves 3rd Place at the EMS World Competition in Las Vegas.
- "Dalmatian Art" unveiled at Fire Station 36.
- 2025 Re-Accreditation Site Visit: Various assessors conducted a review and inspection from December 9–12, 2024, as part of the reaccreditation process.
- Maintained CFAI-Accredited Agency status (Commission on Fire Accreditation International) through annual compliance reporting.
- Insurance Services Office (ISO) site visit took place July 2024.
- Congresswoman Sheila Cherfilus-McCormick visits TFR, recognizing our team at the World Rescue Challenge 2024.
- Hosted the Florida Fire Chiefs Association's Emergency Services Leadership Institute classes.
- Throughout the year, TFR participates in the City's 'Tamarac University' program, educating community members and City staff about Fire Rescue operations."
- HCA Woodmont Hospital honored Fire Station 36 for outstanding pre-hospital care, treatment, and community commitment.
- Ongoing collaboration with Broward County partners to manage and reduce fire risk at Woodmont Natural Area: crews substantially cleared the understory on the north side, treated invasive vegetation, and installed a new hydrant. The preserve remains under evaluation as plans for future prescribed burns are developed.
- TFR Benevolent hosted our second annual golf tournament, raising funds that support community members and staff—enhancing public safety and fostering unity.
- Each month, the TFR's Community Risk Reduction Division performed walkthroughs to raise Operations' awareness of construction developments and life-safety hazards.
- TFR becomes Department of Health's Gold Water Smart Community.

COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION

TFR Community Risk Reduction Division promotes life and property safety through code compliance and public education. The division is organized with a Fire Marshal, an Assistant Fire Marshal, a Plans Examiner, three Fire Inspectors, a Senior Office Specialist, and a Community Education Preparedness Specialist.

Broward County Amendments require that all commercial and multi-family structures be inspected at least annually. The Division is also responsible for new construction fire plan reviews and inspections, permit inspections on new businesses, renovations and improvements to sites and systems, fire investigations, public education, community outreach and to assist as needed with Emergency Management. Members of the Division perform the roles of Firefighter if called upon, Fire Inspector, Fire Investigator and Public Educator.

TFR Community Risk Reduction Division maintains 100% compliance for Broward County mandated safety inspections. 100% Customer Satisfaction according to transactional surveys.



Tamarac Fire Rescue is strategically positioned to mitigate risk in the City of Tamarac. Our firefighters, medics, and inspectors engage with the community daily, gaining valuable insights through medical calls, inspections, and emergency responses. These real-time assessments guide our educational programs and prevention initiatives, allowing us to proactively address safety concerns and reduce potential hazards.



- TFR was named a Red Cross's "**Signature City**" during the National Sound the Alarm Campaign. A total of 421 smoke alarms were installed across 168 homes, along with 5 carbon monoxide alarms.

Community Engagement & Events

- Participated in 73 City events.
- 122 car seats installed
- Community CPR: 108 participants completed full CPR training, and 174 participated in Hands-Only CPR demonstrations at city events.
- Visited the Broward Sheriff's Office as part of Law Enforcement Appreciation Day.
- Achieved Gold Level "Water Smart Community" recognition from the Department of Health.
- 42 fire drills conducted across diverse facilities including schools, hospitals, day cares, nursing homes, and city buildings.

- Participated in the North Lauderdale Parade.







Fires within CITY LIMITS


Health & Safety

Tamarac Fire Rescue has placed the safety division within the Training & EMS Division of the fire department. Establishing such a vital component to the organization is to investigate and review all workplace accidents, safety-related incidents, reportable injuries, illnesses, diseases, and fatalities. This is done so by forming our own departmental Safety Committee. This Committee is made up of both management and labor staff. This committee is required under Florida Administrative Rule 69A, Florida State Statute 633, and NFPA 1500.

Meetings are held quarterly to review member injuries, accidents, and broken equipment. These incidents are reviewed and analyzed to ensure the health and safety of our members, along with recommendations and actions to prevent and or reduce these incidents from happening in the future. In 2024, we had fourteen injuries to our personnel. The safety committee has reviewed the incidents and made recommendations to the administrative staff regarding any possible corrective actions necessary. One notable change this year was adding an additional spotter outside the vehicle when backing our apparatus. The standalone Captain position with a Scene Safety Officer designation has been in place for over a year and used successfully during emergency incidents and during training exercises.

The committee is continuously looking for ways to improve health and safety for our members through a review of new equipment, apparatus design, current national standards, trends, and our policies and procedures.

2024's Annual Physical Fitness Assessments Lifescan Wellness (IAFF contract Wellness Program Article 20). 103 personnel participated in the annual physical and 2 were deemed not fit for duty. Those members received a fit for duty clearance.

LOGISTICS/FIRE SUPPORT

The logistics division reports directly to the Assistant Chief of Administration who in turn updates the Deputy Chief of Operations and the Fire Chief on logistical, procurement, and budgetary matters. The logistics division monitors and tracks all departmental purchases and maintains a balanced budget for the Fire Chief. The logistical officer is responsible for the ordering, disbursement, and maintenance of equipment.

Tamarac Fire Rescue Logistics consists of a Fire Officer and a Logistics Technician. Annually, the officer is responsible for reviewing all vendor contracts to make sure they are still current and meet the city's requirements. Through monthly and quarterly meetings, the Logistics Division can update the Fire Chief on the status of projects, contracts, and budgetary needs.
